



WHILE RENOVATIONS ARE RARELY STRAIGHTFORWARD, every once in a while the stars align and everything just comes together. Such was the case when seasoned renovators Kate and Kris came across this crumbling 1900s weatherboard cottage – or rather, what was left of it. Having just competed a successful reno, Kate was contacted out of the blue by the real estate agent who sold their last project, suggesting she take a look at an interesting property. The home, uninhabited for more than 50 years, had changed hands twice in the past tew years, and although previous owners had council-approved plans to renovate, nothing eventuated. "The property was in a great location, close to transport, had a north-facing rear, was only twe kilometres from the city, and had car parking." Kate says. "How could we not take on this project?"

Once the contracts had been signed. Kate was lucky enough to secure their previous builder, Ben Thomas Builder, at short notice and began working on the plans. "I reconfigured the entirety of the interior, respectited the exteriors and relocated and redesigned most of the glazing." Kate says. Given the decrepit state of the property and heritage specifications, the hallway and man bedroom were the only original features able to be retained, along with a couple of oddy placed channeys that Kate creatively adapted into the plans – the first was plastered up and worked into the ensule and the second became a lucurious outdoor freplace. The day of settlement coincided with council approval, and after a brief settleck (despite testing, bedrook was discovered beneath the soil, causing debys). Ben began work on site almost immediately.

Fast-forward to today, and walls costed in Haymes Greyology 1 flow through the home, allowing artworks and the garden views to provide impact. White-oiled oak flooring from Maff was chosen to create a seamless yet robust finish to withstand "the daily grind with two boys", while the lighting, sourced from local and international creatives, is simplistic yet impactful.

The build took just shy of a year and although "Intense", it was amazingly delivered on time and on budget. The end result is a spacious two-storey family home that is practical and inviting, with a calming interior. Not only is it a "lovely space to be together as a family and entertain," Kate says, "there's also quiet spots to retreat for some peace and quiet -bitss." •
